We are happy to offer you the following opportunities to learn more about gardening. Please remember that many of the classes are limited. Please register early to assure a spot in the classes you wish to attend.

Starting Transplants Indoors ~ Tuesday, January 17th at 6:30 p.m.: Growing your own transplants indoors is challenging but not impossible. Learn tips and techniques to help you successfully grow healthy plants indoors under lights. We will discuss different lighting options for your consideration. Participants will receive materials to take home to grow their own transplants. We will use several of our seed starting props as door prizes. **Cost: \$10.00**

Proper Pruning Techniques ~ Tuesday, January 24th at 6:30 p.m.: Proper pruning is an integral part of landscape management. Many homeowners are daunted by the task or plunge ahead hacking mercilessly. Join us to learn the basics of proper pruning, including how to make proper cuts, appropriate timing, and even when to call a professional. Door prizes. **Free but must register in advance.**

Easy Cut Flowers From Seed ~ Thursday, February 2nd at 3:00 p.m.: We will discuss great cut flowers that can be seeded directly into the garden. There are several easily grown plants that can provide bouquets over a long season. Low Input Lawn Care ~ Thursday, March 2nd at 6:30 p.m.: Lawn care can range from full blown golf course management to mowing whatever happens to be growing out there. Surprisingly you can have a very nice yard with a minimal input approach. We will discuss why less fertilizer can be beneficial and how to get the most out of your turf by simply following the grasses natural biology and seasonal growth. ***Free but must register in advance.***

Unusual Annuals From Seed ~ Tuesday, March 7th at 3:00 p.m.: Some less common jewels for the garden. There are lots of interesting annuals beyond what nurseries offer. We will discuss many old fashioned cottage garden varieties you may want to try as well as some spectacular giant annuals that can be very dramatic if you have the room. We will send you home with seeds for a few of them to grow yourself. ***Cost: \$10.00.***

Vegetable Gardening for Beginners, The Early Spring Crops ~ Thursday, March 9th at 6:00 p.m.: There are many great reasons to grow some of your own food. We will teach the very basic concepts of growing vegetables. This class will focus on the early spring crops that can be planted and harvested before the main spring planting window. It is far easier than you might think. Participants will receive a copy of our vegetable growing guide and a packet of seeds. ***Class will be held at Southern States Cooperative, 2570 Palumbo Drive. Cost is free, but pre-registration is required to reserve a seat.***

Potatoes ~ Thursday, March 16 at 6:30 p.m.: Many home vegetable gardeners dismiss the potato from their list of crops, citing their inexpensive availability and space requirements. As many of you know, home garden produce tastes far better than supermarket fare. The potato is an ancient and wildly diverse plant. We will discuss varieties, growing requirements, space saving growing techniques, and each participant will leave with an assortment of seed potatoes for their own parcel. ***Cost: \$15.00.***

Onions and Leeks ~ Tuesday, March 21st at 6:30 p.m.: This class will provide an overview of the commonly grown onions and their relatives. We will provide transplants of newer, harder to find onions and leeks for your garden. You can have some form of onion for kitchen use year round with a little planning. ***Cost: \$10.00.***

A Glimpse of a Lunatic's Garden ~ Monday (yes Monday), March 27th at 6:00 p.m.: A virtual tour of 2016 through the seasons. Some of the better photos and plant combinations in Jamie's garden from the last year. Annuals, perennials, trees, shrubs, vegetables and, of course, a few animals. All strung together with the usual meandering narrative. Plan to stay a while.....You can't shut him up. We are starting early to cover a lot of territory. 6:00-8:00 p.m. ***Cost: \$20.00, with all proceeds going to the display gardens at The Arboretum.***

Primocane Blackberries ~ Thursday, April 13th at 6:30 p.m.: Perhaps you have heard of these new blackberries that bear fruit on the current season's growth like fall-bearing raspberries. These varieties extend our blackberry season into fall and are nice compliments to summer varieties. The fruits have high sugar levels. Each participant will receive 3 Prime Ark Freedom berry plants for their backyard homestead. ***Cost: \$20.00.***

Dahlias ~ Tuesday, April 18th at 6:30 p.m.: Many people shy away from tender bulbs because of the hassle associated with digging and winter storage. This is actually not a big deal and many are affordable enough to treat as a annual. Dahlias are spectacular in bloom and come in a wide variety of colors, shapes and sizes. We will teach you to grow beautiful dahlias and send you home with an assortment for your garden. **Cost: \$20.00**

Coral Bells ~ Thursday, April 20th at 6:30 p.m.: The market has been saturated with new Heucheras featuring brightly colored leaves. Unfortunately, the old fashioned, “tough as nails” coral bells have become harder to find. We will cover a wide variety of Heucheras and hybrids but send you home with some of the more traditional types. Spring hummingbird favorites! **Cost: \$15.00**

Vegetable Gardening for Beginners ~ Thursday, April 27th at 6:30 p.m.: Ideal introductory class for those new to vegetable gardening. This class will cover warm season crops like tomatoes, peppers, beans, and squash. We will discuss simple approaches to having a small garden. Participants will receive a copy of our vegetable growing guide and a packet of seeds. **Class will be held at the Beaumont Branch Public Library, 3080 Fieldstone Way. Only in recent years have breeders turned their attention to making better varieties. Improvements include shorter plants, unique dark foliage and new colors that bloom for much longer periods of time. We are sourcing some of the best varieties for your garden. Very reliable and easy to grow once established. You will receive a nice assortment of varieties as bare root divisions. **Cost: \$20.00**

Hens and Chicks ~ Tuesday, May 16th at 6:30 p.m.: Of course we mean the succulent sempervivums and not poultry this time. Most of us are familiar with these little evergreen rosettes and how incredibly durable they are. They work great in succulent planters and areas with poor, dry soil. We will cover care and provide an assortment for you to grow in your garden. **Cost: \$20.00.**

Elephant Ears ~ Thursday, June 8th at 6:30 p.m.: Impressive tropical giants that are easy to grow. This class will expose you to unusual varieties focusing primarily on the upright Alocasias. These are sure to amaze visitors and most can be overwintered easily. Recent interest has made unusual forms and leaf shapes readily available. We will provide a plant or two for your garden. **Cost: \$20.00.**

Perennials for Shade Gardens ~ Thursday, June 15th at 3:00 p.m.: There are many great perennials for shady gardens. We will cover some of the more reliable ones. Dry shade among tree roots is near impossible but we will have a suggestion or two for those difficult spots. There is a whole universe beyond hosta and ferns. Take home small plants for your own shady retreat. **Cost: \$15.00.**

Vegetable Gardening for Beginners Part II, Maintaining ~ Tuesday, June 20th at 6:30 p.m.:

This class will cover some of the most basic questions for any first time gardener when it comes to maintaining the new plot. Topics will include things like watering, pest/weed management, and fertilizing. Participants will receive a copy of our vegetable growing guide and there will also be drawings for a few door prizes that any first time gardener will love. **Class will be held at the Fayette County Extension Office. Cost is free, but pre-registration is required to reserve a seat.**

NEW CLASS: Flower Show Demonstrating ~ Tuesday, June 20th at 6:30 p.m.: Do you have questions about entering flower arrangements at the Bluegrass Flower & Vegetable show at the Lexington Lions Club Bluegrass Fair? Mary Turner of Lexington Council Garden Clubs, will demonstrate designs suitable for several of the classes. We will also address entering horticulture exhibits (flowers, fruits, and vegetables). **Cost: Free but must register in advance to reserve a seat.**

NEW CLASS: Discovering the Many Uses of Herbs ~ June 27th at 6:00 p.m.: An herb demonstration which will covers several areas: culinary, medicinal, teas, scented and the knot garden. The class will highlight herbs used in flavoring food and drinks, herbal usage in pharmaceutical industries, varieties of teas the history of knot gardens and enjoy the wonderful fragrances of the scented herbs. There will also be demonstration of how to grow herbs in a pot. **Class will meet at the Arboretum, 500 Alumni Drive, Lexington. Cost: \$10.00, class is limited to 25 participants. Preregistration is required.**

Oyster Mushrooms ~ Thursday, June 29th at 6:30 p.m.: There are many varieties of mushrooms that can be grown at home. We will demonstrate how to grow one of the easier types, oyster mushrooms, in straw. Participants will receive live spawn to take home and begin their own cultures. These should begin producing in the fall. **Cost: \$20.00.**

Making Perennials Work ~ Thursday, July 6th at 3:00 p.m.: A few tips about getting the most from your perennial garden. Matching plants to your growing conditions is vital. We will discuss the importance of foliage and successive bloom seasons as well as pruning and management techniques. We will also discuss some exceptional perennial performers for our area. **Cost: \$10.00.**

The Fall Vegetable Garden, Plan Now for Late Fall - Winter Harvest ~ Thursday, July 13th at 6:30 p.m.: Most seasoned gardeners regularly plant fall vegetable crops. With some planning, season extending techniques and proper storage it is possible to eat from your garden well into winter. We will discuss best varieties for storage, which crops can be mulched in ground and which things are actually hardy enough to make it with no care. We can certainly enjoy fresh produce through December and often later. We will furnish seeds and/or transplants for your home garden. **Cost: \$10.00.**

Weed Management ~ Tuesday, July 18th at 6:30 p.m.: Bush honeysuckle, winter creeper euonymus, escaped ornamental pears...the list goes on and on. We are all experiencing problems with these highly invasive woody plants and control measures can be intimidating. Joe Omelian, UK weed science specialist will discuss management of woody invasive and which options are most effective. We will discuss herbicides, special tools to make the job easier and various tips to improve your success. Joe is also a great resource for any weed management questions you may have. **Cost: \$5.00.**

Renovating Lawns ~ Thursday, August 3rd at 6:30 p.m.: Late summer is the best time to re-seed lawns in Kentucky. We will cover basic lawn care with an emphasis on how to best seed or renovate your existing lawn. We will present several greener, lower input approaches to traditional lawn care. **Cost: Free but must register in advance.**

Crape Myrtles ~ Thursday, August 10th at 3:00 p.m.: Although we are too far north to seriously grow these as trees, there are still many applications for crape myrtles grown as shrubs or pruned like giant perennials. Newer varieties have been selected for foliage color, compact size, longer bloom, disease resistance and fall color. We will feature some varieties that have performed well in Kentucky. We will raffle several plants as door-prizes. **Cost: \$10.00.**

Hydrangeas ~ Tuesday, August 22nd at 6:30 p.m.: Not to burst your bubble, but those giant pink and blue varieties tend to perform poorly in our climate. We hope to open your eyes to all the other wonderful hydrangeas that you might not know as well. And yes, we will offer some tips that may improve the odds of your being successful with the blue ones. We will raffle our examples as door prizes. **Cost: \$10.00.**

Autumn Crocus and Colchicums ~ Thursday, September 7th at 6:30 p.m.: Although these colorful blooms look shocking amid the fallen leaves it is refreshing to have such color when everything else is winding down. From the small purple and ghostly lavender crocus to the giant pink and white colchicums, these are a delight for the serious plant collector. We will provide bulbs for your home garden. **Cost: \$25.00.**

Saving Flower Seeds ~ Thursday, September 14th at 6:30 p.m.: It is very easy to save and store seeds. This class will cover cross pollination hazards, hybrid versus open pollinated, how to dry and store for longest life. Learn what is practical for the home gardener. **Cost: Free but must register in advance to reserve a seat.**

Peonies ~ Tuesday, September 19th at 6:30 p.m.: There are few perennials that you can plant and forget but peonies certainly qualify. Peonies often exist in cemeteries without care for decades. Join us to learn about herbaceous peonies and take home three of these gorgeous plants for your own garden. **Cost: \$20.00.**

Storing Winter Bulbs ~ Thursday, October 5th at 3:00 p.m.: Our discussion will focus primarily on tender flowering plants but many of the same curing and storage techniques work for root vegetables. Learn best practices for keeping things like cannas, dahlias, elephant ears, etc. from year to year. **Cost: \$5.00.**

Minor Bulbs ~ Thursday, October 12th at 6:30 p.m.: An introduction to wonderful bulbs far less common than the typical tulips, crocus and daffodils. Many of the smaller varieties are ideal for planting in natural areas or mixing into perennial borders. Participants will take home a sampler of several unique bulb varieties to plant at home. **Cost: \$20.00.**

Daffodils ~ Tuesday, October 17th at 6:30 p.m.: Everyone loves the sight of the cheerful spring daffodils with their promise of warmer days to come. We all know the large yellow trumpet varieties but there 13 divisions of these amazing bulbs including miniatures, small cupped, double, etc. We will explore the genus with tips for planting and naturalizing. Each class member will take home a sampler of lesser known daffodils and some other special spring flowering companion bulbs for their own garden. We will include a generous assortment. **Cost: \$20.00**

Lilies ~ Thursday, November 2nd at 6:30 p.m.: We see many more daylilies planted than true lilies, which are grown from bulbs, but there is no denying their beauty and, often, wonderful fragrance. The most common include the Asiatic and oriental types but there are many great hybrids and species to consider. Indulge yourself in this informative crash course about lilies. Take home an assortment of bulbs to plant for a spectacular display next summer. **Cost: \$25.00**

Stump the Horticulture Agent, "Ask Anything" ~ Tuesday, November 7th at 6:30 p.m.: Question and answer session- an opportunity for the audience to steer the conversation to whatever topics you desire. Put the agent in the hot seat and hopefully I will know the answers. Any horticulture topic. **Cost: Free, but advance registration is required to reserve a seat.**

My Favorite Garden Tools ~ Thursday, November 16th at 6:30 p.m.: Various tools, equipment and accessories - Over the years all serious gardeners find tools and accessories that they consider indispensable. In this session I will discuss various implements that work very well in the landscape and vegetable garden. All shovels and hoes are not created equal. Many of our examples will be raffled as door prizes. **Cost: \$5.00**

Holiday Greens ~ Tuesday, December 5th at 3:00 p.m.: You can create beautiful holiday wreaths, garlands, swags and centerpieces using materials from your own yard. 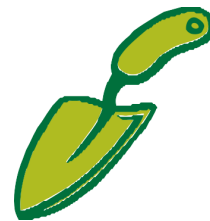
